Each year when we look over our annual report numbers, we see the tremendous progress our staff and program participants have made in just 12 months.

The dramatic success of new services like the Goodwill Job
Connection hint at just how much. In just its first year this free
public walk-in job placement service placed 404 job seekers into
jobs in the community.

So now we wonder what other programs we can add to bridge the gaps that keep hundreds or thousands of others in our community from achieving their goals of work and self-sufficiency. Clearly, the need is great.

And so are the rewards. For the first time, we can quantify the results of our operations and job placement services thanks to a new model that calculates the economic impact of our programs and services in the communities we serve. For 2010, we're pleased to report that Goodwill Industries of Tulsa generated a total economic impact in excess of \$60 million. Our challenge now is to top this number ... and we have just 365 days to do it.

GOODWILL'S IMPACT ON THE LOCAL ECONOMY

For many of our donors, driving away from the Goodwill Donation Center with an empty car is the end of the story. But it certainly doesn't end there for us.

Those gently used clothes and household goods will begin to generate economic good from the moment the attendant carries them into the donation center.

You see, the money raised from their sale will help to pay not only the donation center attendant's salary, but also those of Goodwill processing center employees, store employees, job trainers and Goodwill program administrators.

But it doesn't end there. Donations also help pay for training programs that prepare non-Goodwill employees for jobs at businesses throughout the Tulsa area. And the wages they earn will carry the economic impact of that donation even further into the community. The same is true for public services like the Goodwill Job Connection.

The way we see it at Goodwill, when you drop off your donation, things are just starting to get good.



ACHIEVER OF THE YEAR


Carol Gibson

Carol Gibson might have ended up a statistic: one of five million American women trapped in the nightmare of domestic violence. But her courage led her from an abusive marriage in St. Louis to the safety of her sister's home in Tulsa, and Goodwill training led her toward a new and brighter future. Carol received computer and call center training through Goodwill's job training center. At Goodwill, she also received the encouragement and support to build her confidence and overcome feelings of helplessness left over from years of domestic abuse. Carol's efforts landed her a job at the Goodwill South Annex, where she now works as a receptionist. Encouraged by her success, she enrolled last fall in two online courses at TCC and made the President's Honor Roll. In February Carol became a student in Goodwill's new Certified Medical Administrative Assistant Training Program.

"I feel like I am getting my life back and everyone here at Goodwill has been such a big part of that happening," Carol says.

More than 4,500

individuals were served by Goodwill programs.



GOODWILL'S WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

Goodwill responds to the employment needs of persons with a wide range of skills and capabilities by offering a variety of programs preparing them for the world of work.

Tulsa *Works* moves people from public support to self-sufficiency through life skills classes, case management providing individual and family support, and job training.

Job Training teaches marketable skills by starting with employment essentials, followed by training in call center services, computer applications, forklift operation, private security or certified medical administrative assistance.

Goodwill East Campus provides extended work experience in a self-paced environment where people with disabilities earn a paycheck while learning high quality, safe work habits.

Transitional Work Adjustment Training

helps prepare high school students with disabilities for success in the workplace by providing paid work experience in real work settings.

Supported Employment provides assistance to those with disabilities in assessing job strengths, job development and placement, and training by a job coach who gradually fades when no longer needed.

Enclaves and Job Shares offer continuously supervised employment in small groups within the community for workers who have severe disabilities.

Job Connection provides assistance with job search to any community member who is unemployed or underemployed. Services include online job search, job leads, networking, resume assistance and practice interviews.

Through our training and placement programs, our program participants gain the skills and support they need to find a job ... and the satisfaction that comes from being contributing members of their community.

A self-described troublemaker, Jeremy chose a life of drug-dealing and crime that ended with a high-speed police chase and a devastating car crash in 2001. The resulting brain injury left Jeremy with amnesia and unable to perform the simplest of tasks.

During his rehabilitation process,

Jeremy and his mother learned about
Goodwill's programs for individuals with
disabilities. This led Jeremy to apply with
Goodwill, and in 2004 he was hired to work in
Goodwill's state janitorial program. He is now
a valued member of Goodwill's janitorial crew
and a contributing member of the community.

With Jeremy's steady employment, he and his mother were able to purchase and remodel a house. I think Jeremy described his journey best when he stated, "I was on my way to the Big House and now I own my own house!"

GOODWILL'S IMPACT ON OUR ENVIRONMENT

Last year Goodwill received 359,000 donations from the public, diverting millions of pounds of goods from the waste stream. Over the past 10 years alone, we've diverted more than 110 million pounds.

We "recycle" gently used donated clothing and household goods in our stores, extending their life. Goods not suitable for retail are sold in secondary markets to reduce waste and generate revenue to support our programs. And we take part in programs such as Dell Reconnect, which responsibly recycled over 700,000 pounds of donated computer equipment just last year.

Our efforts in recycling, sustainability and environmental stewardship earned Goodwill Industries of Tulsa the 2010 Henry Bellmon Sustainability Award for "Responsible Economic Growth", a prestigious honor from Sustainability Tulsa and the Southside Rotary. We are proud to be recognized for our decadeslong mission of sustainable self-support.

PERSEVERANCE AWARD

Azande Campbell

Life has never "gone by the numbers" for Azande
Campbell. At four, he was hit by a truck and injured so
badly doctors feared he would not survive. But he did.
Then they worried that brain stem damage would
leave him in a permanent vegetative state. But again
Azande proved them wrong.

Azande recovered and grew up to lead a productive life. Upon graduating from high school in 1993 he accepted a janitorial position with Goodwill and worked for more than 10 years.

Ultimately old injuries caught up with Azande, and he had to be on disability for a while. But he found that boring and worked to regain his strength. In 2006 he returned to work cleaning Goodwill stores.

Through resources provided by Goodwill,
Azande learned about Habitat for Humanity. With
Goodwill's assistance he applied for a house for his
family of four. He has now completed more
than 700 volunteer hours and will be moving his
family into a refurbished Habitat home in the near future.

Azande Campbell just won't quit. "I plan to work for a long time," he says, "this time until I retire!"

Now 22, Danita was a senior at Mingo Valley Christian School when she was referred to Goodwill for Transitional Work Adjustment Training. She spent half-days working in a Goodwill store gaining on-the-job experience and confidence as she interacted with customers.

After high school, Danita continued to receive assistance from Job Coach Daniel Wood as she started her job as a Courtesy Clerk at Food Pyramid. Now Danita is on her own at work — sacking groceries, stocking shelves and taking carry-outs to customers' cars.

An expert bargain shopper herself, she's used her earnings to buy her own TV and furniture and is now saving for a computer. "It feels good," she says about having a job and income. "I like being able to spend my own money."





- **\$10.3 million** Paid wages and benefits of \$10.3 million to Goodwill employees
