DONATED GOODS PROGRAM

Collection, transportation, processing and sale of donated goods provide jobs at Goodwill.

Goodwill employs individuals in every imaginable capacity:

donation center personnel who unload your car; processing facility staff
who sort and prep items for sale; drivers who deliver goods to stores; sales
associates who stock merchandise and run cash registers; cleaning crews
who keep our facilities spic-and-span; and many others who work behind
the scenes to keep things running smoothly.

Every member of our team serves to make sure that your donation fulfills its ultimate purpose: finding its way into our stores, then into the shopping baskets of Goodwill store customers.

Without the hard work of our donated goods staff, it would be impossible to generate the store sales dollars that power the Goodwill programs and services that help so many in our community to find work ... and carry on the economic circle of Goodwill.



HOW DONATED ITEMS GET TO GOODWILL STORES

- Each year, Goodwill receives millions of pounds of donated goods from individuals in the communities we serve. These items are accepted and pre-sorted at our 21 donation centers.
- Th. For You Donasio
- On a daily basis, items are transported by truck from donation centers to our central processing facility.
- At our processing center, we inspect donated items to ensure that they meet our criteria for resale. Goodwill employees examine clothing for signs of wear or damage and examine household items and books to verify that they are in good repair.
- Before leaving the processing center, clothing is placed on hangers and sorted into categories. Likewise, household goods are sorted and prepped for transport to stores.
- Processed goods are transported to our nine Goodwill stores where they are checked in by receiving personnel and arranged on the sales floor by sales associates.

RETAIL STORES

Store sales provide revenue to pay employees and fund training programs.

Fashion-savvy shoppers name Goodwill stores among their favorite places to browse for the latest styles; they know that some of the most fashionable members of our community donate to Goodwill.

They also know that at our nine Goodwill store locations, they'll find these department store fashions at thrift store prices. Here, they can purchase clothing and accessories, housewares and collectibles, books and toys with the assurance that they'll get more "stretch" from their shopping dollar ... and put less stress on their family budget.

While they're at it, they're also doing good for their community.

The income from their purchases helps to provide jobs, training,
opportunity and hope to hundreds of individuals who are served
by the programs and services of Goodwill Industries of Tulsa.

Our shoppers keep the circle of Goodwill going — finding what they need in our stores, helping others to find the jobs that they need right here at home.

JOB TRAINING PROGRAMS

Our job training programs prepare individuals for jobs in the community.

Tulsa WORKS

A multi-agency effort designed to move people from public support to self-sufficiency. Provides case management, occupational skills training, structured placement and follow-up support.

Occupational Skills Training

Teaches marketable skills that can pave the way to self-sufficiency.

Programs include: call center training, computer applications training, employment essentials, forklift operator training and private security training.

Goodwill East Campus

Provides work experience and support in a sheltered environment. Here, people with disabilities can earn a paycheck while acquiring the work skills and confidence they'll need for a job in the community.

Transitional Work Adjustment Training

Helps high school students with disabilities gain work experience and learn behaviors required for successful job placement.

Supported Employment

Assists those with disabilities in finding a job in the community, then helps them maintain it with individualized follow-up.

Enclaves and Job Shares

Provides continuous supervision to small groups of individuals who have severe disabilities, enabling them to be successfully employed in the community.



Iran "Goodwill laid the foundation for me. They let me know that it's possible to pull yourself up again." Iran McGinnis was down to his last unemployment check when he started job training at Goodwill. His dream job: working with recovering drug and alcohol addicts. Eight years into recovery himself, he hoped to help others as he had been helped. Goodwill arranged an interview at the 12 & 12 rehab center; he started work the same day. Soon, he was promoted to a position that allows him to interact with clients all over the facility. He gives Goodwill the credit: "They lit the fire in my bones."

Gary "I'm not the kind of person to sit around and do nothing. That's not who I am." Gary Healy and his family were living in a tent when he found Goodwill. A health problem had ended his career in corrections and it was downhill from there. Goodwill gave him a hand back up with private security training. He passed the Council on Law **Enforcement Education and Training** exam and began doing contract security work at Verizon. They liked him so much that when they changed security companies, they asked Goodwill to help place him with the new contractor. Which says a lot about who Gary is.

Josh "They found a good opportunity for me. I'm where I want to be." Josh Tripp isn't much of a talker until you ask him about dogs. Then you learn quickly how much he loves his job as a kennel worker for the ASPCA. Goodwill helped place him there last year after he finished work adjustment training. He took to his new job right away and needs little help from his job coach. His only problem? Not being able to take home all the dogs he cares for.



Floyd "I like taking something and making it beautiful again. It's like a makeup artist; my makeup is waxing the floor, I guess." Few people ever see Floyd working. But thousands of people appreciate his handiwork. For almost 15 years, Floyd has served on floor maintenance crews either at Goodwill sites or at other companies that contract with Goodwill for floor-cleaning services. As a floor tech, Floyd steams carpets, strips and waxes linoleum and keeps ceramic tile floors sparkling. Because he does his job after everyone else in the building goes home, he rarely gets to hear others admiring the results of his hard work. But as employee of the year, he can be sure that they do.

COMMUNITY JOB PLACEMENTS

Trained employees are placed in jobs with employers in the community.

The donations, the processing facilities, the stores, the programs ...

The purpose of every aspect of Goodwill is to help further our goal of helping people find and maintain jobs.

And when we talk about jobs, we're not talking only about those at our donation centers, processing facilities and stores. Many Goodwill employees

— such as Employee of the Year, Floyd Topper — fill jobs on crews that provide contract services to companies outside our walls.

But what may come as a real surprise is that we're also talking about employees who have benefited from Goodwill services, but whose names will never appear on our payroll.

These are the thousands of working people — such as Graduate of the Year Iran McGinnis and Perseverance Award-winner Gary Healey — who have completed Goodwill workplace training programs and subsequently found placement in jobs outside of Goodwill, jobs that allow them to resume fully independent and self-sufficient lives.

The circle of Goodwill is bigger than you might have thought. With your help, we hope to make it bigger still.
